What is Forest School?



It is **not**:

- A badge that schools can collect
- The same as any other sort of outdoor education
- Always in a forest
- All about tools and fire.
- Led by unqualified leaders

Key Principles



1. It is a long-term process of frequent and regular sessions in a woodland or natural environment, rather than a one-off visit





2. It takes place in a woodland or natural wooded environment to support the development of a relationship between the learner and the natural world.





3. It aims to promote the holistic development of all those involved, fostering resilient, confident, independent and creative learners





4.It offers learners
the opportunity to
take supported
risks appropriate
to the
environment and
to themselves.





5. It is run by qualified Forest School practitioners who continuously maintain and develop their professional practice





6. It uses a range of learner-centred processes to create a community for development and learning



How widespread is Forest School?



In 2012 it was estimated that 10000 Forest School practitioners had been trained in the UK.



Training



- 38 organisations or individuals are members of the UK Forest School Trainers Network.
- Many more (we don't know how many) are operating without joining the network.
- Courses range in price from £399 (2200 zł) to £1249 (7000 zł)
- Training time ranges from 5 to 10 days
- There is no government regulation of forest school practice.
